### **Family Engagement**

Parents became involved in our program through participation in home visits, parent-teacher conferences, Policy Council and/or Health Advisory Committee, and Family Community event such as the 4<sup>th</sup> of July Kids Parade, MSUE Family Fun Night, SISU and an art show.

## **Transitions**

Parents/guardians, staff and children participated in meetings and events, with a return to classroom visits and in-person orientations.

Early Head Start had 10 children transition into the classroom setting, Head Start had 39 children transition into kindergarten.

Staff transition meetings were held with all school districts to review the children that transitioned to kindergarten to best support the needs of these children and families. Early Head Stast also reinstated classroom visits for those children transitioning to Head Start. Children who transitioned outside of our service area were supported by connecting parents with programming options and the utilization of Authorization forms regarding their consent to share information.

Progress was achieved in all areas of development, with Approaches to Learning exhibiting the most growth.

CLASS assesses interactions between children and classroom staff in three broad domains of classroom quality; Emotional Support, Classroom Organization, and Instructional Support. For each Head Start classroom, a certified CLASS observer conducts observations focusing on the 10 dimensions listed below. Scoring, using a 7-point scale, is completed at the end of each observational cycle. The scale depicts 1 as low quality, with 7 being high quality, except for the Dimension of Negative climate, which reverses the number rating (1 is high quality).

Effective November 2020, the CLASS quality thresholds require a minimum score of 5 in Emotional Support, 5 in Classroom Organization and 2.3 in Instructional support. As depicted, our program is meeting or exceeding designated threshholds.

#### **Community Assessment**

The most recent data regarding Gogebic and Ontonagon counties portrays a total population of 20,229 residents. For children (ages 0-17) living in poverty, the average rate is 23%, which is a decrease of 5% over the last 5 years. However, households in poverty are at 51%. Children participating in the WIC program is averaging at 53%, and those receiving food assistance is approximately 25%. Three and Four year old children that are attending preschool has decreased by an average of 35%, with approximately 31% of this age group participating in preschool early childhood education services.

Children with health insurance is at 96%, which is only 1% below the state average. Fully immunized toddlers, ages 19-35 months, average at 69%, which is higher than the State of Michigan's rate of 66%. Low-birthweight babies average about 11%, which is higher than the State of Michigan's rate of 9%.
